Women, Infants and Children (WIC)

The WIC program provides supplemental food and nutrition information for low-income women, infants and children in Piatt and DeWitt Counties. Eligible participants include women during pregnancy, post-partum, and lactating periods; and children under the age of five. Participants must meet the financial guidelines established by the USDA and have an identified medical or nutritional risk. Breast feeding support is also available.
